34-2024 – Leading

We all find leading difficult at the best of times. Sometimes, you are best to work out what to lead by *eliminating* the Suits you must not lead. Then there will be 1 or 2 Suits to choose from

Here are 2 Hands where West was helped as Declarer by poor leads:

1. Dealer West EW Vul

- (1) Strong Hand
- (2) 0-3 Points, any shape
- (3) Strong balanced Hand, 21+ Points
- (4) East could not Pass fast enough

North led S6 (away from his SK)

West took stock. After the Spade lead, there are 6 sure Tricks, with the best prospects for 2 more being in Diamonds

West won the lead with SQ, cashed DA and led a small one. North won with DK, and led another Spade which West ducked for 1 round, another Spade followed

West won SA, and knowing he had an entry to Dummy with D9, thought about cashing HA, HK and H8, hoping the Hearts would break 3:3 to give a 9th Trick. However, commonsense prevailed, as West could go down with this approach if North has the long Spades and the long Hearts

So, West cashed out making 8 Tricks, when 7 were only there

North should not have led away from SK. He knew from the Bidding that West had 20 + Points, so he needed to be patient and wait for his 3 Kings to win tricks. He also cannot lead a Diamond or a Club, so all was left was to lead H4 and hope. West could not make more than 7 Tricks in that case – eventually SK would take SQ

- (1) Without at least 2 Honours in a suit, many will not pre-empt at the 3-level (the late and great Ross Crichton taught me that, but West broke his rule)
- (2) A bold but good bid, knowing East has a few Tricks to contribute

North led C5 (leading away from CK)

West took the Club finesse to hand, then finessed CJ and played CA, throwing a losing Diamond. Next, he played HJ. South rose with HA, returned another Heart, won by HK. West then led a small spade to SQ, and cashed SA

West ended up losing 3 Tricks, 1 Spade, 1 Heart and 1 Diamond. Game made

North should not have led away from CK. A Spade is also too risky. The HQ is a potential Trick, so Diamonds should be led. Lead DA and a small one. South wins DK, and later the Defence will make a Spade and a Heart – 1 off

MORAL OF THE STORY

Sometimes a lead is obvious (e.g. Partner's suit, or top of a sequence)

But sometimes it is not clear what to lead, so before leading it pays to eliminate Suits you *must not* lead, and the choice then becomes clearer
