## 43.2024 – Dire Straits (Correction)

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On 1 November 2024, I wrote this article, but it contained an error at the end – with 4 Cards left in each Hand, I said Play C5, and you must make.

In fact, you must play H3. My error.

How did this happen? I spent a few hours working out how 7S would make, Double Dummy, and I found the way.

But I did not type it up correctly

This was the Article – see H3 in Red at the end:

**Dealer N Both Vul** 

Somehow, you end up in 7S as East in this Hand:

You look at Dummy. Things look bleak. If SQ is with South, Spades break 3:3, CJ falls under CA, CK or CQ and....lots more things go well

All very unlikely

What could save you? It is the duty of every Bridge Player to try to make the Hand

Your best (and only realistic) hope is a Cross-Ruff

Win DA, play SJ, North covers with SQ (correct play), win with SA. Play a small Club to CK. Play DK. Ruff a Diamond in Hand, 5 Tricks made so far

You are now in Hand:

You play CA followed by CQ, throwing 2 Hearts from Dummy. Then AK of Hearts

You play H3, and no matter what South plays, you have the rest (try it to see)

## **MORAL OF THE STORY**

You must always try a path to make. Here as North covers SJ with SQ, you can make by cross-ruffing

Can you find this path? I doubt anyone could – it took me quite a while with the Hands laid out on the kitchen table

Addendum:

What if North does not cover SJ with SQ? Same result, with careful play...7S makes
