Both S and N upvalued their Hands with a Singleton -4 S is bold bidding

## THE PLAY

West led HQ
How should Declarer play?
Declarer has 3 Aces in the side Suits, so must make 7 Spades on a Cross-ruff
He cannot let the Defenders win a Trick, as they surely will play a Spade to limit the Cross-Ruff
There is one important Card missing - can you see it?
Well done if you did - it is S10
You should win HA, cash CA, ruff a Club low, then cash DA and Ruff a Diamond low
Then you should Cross Ruff Clubs and Diamonds with your top 4 Spades. You now have 9 Tricks, with S8 and S9 left, one in each hand

You play C8, ruffing with S9. West can over-ruff, but S8 is the $10^{\text {th }}$ Trick in your hand (if West does not over-Ruff, then lead a Diamond back to S8, making 11 Tricks!)

## MORAL OF THE STORY

Most of us do not look deep into suits, looking at $A, K, Q$ and $J-$ but often 10 s and 9 s and even 8 s are important cards

Here making one of S9 or S8 gives you the tenth Trick to make your Contract
