- (1) We play Weak 2D, so I decided to bid we are not supposed to have another 5-card suit, but I thought: 'what the heck' to all those silly rules
- (2) I think West should bid 2H as EW are NV (though the CK singleton is a weakness which rightly may put many bidders off)
- (3) It is hard for East to bid, even with 12 Points, as East has no Major, just Clubs and Diamonds. Maybe East could have Doubled for takeout?
- (4) Aggressive bidding.....
- (5) Knows partner must have 6-5 in Clubs and Spades, so bids 4S (I like this bid)

THE PLAY

West led H6, and South won with HA. South then played SA and SK, and the DA, followed by CQ. East put up CA, South ruffed and CK fell

South then ruffed a Diamond in Dummy, played CJ throwing H2, ruffed a Club back (West did not overruff). South then played DK and ran the Diamonds. West eventually won the last Spade. 12 Tricks made

MORAL OF THE STORY

Aggressive bidding with shapely hands can pay off handsomely. Even if it does not make, it hampers the opponents in finding their best fit
