# 29-2023 – Another Con Job

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This Hand came up last week, and the Club's serial con artist was at it again:

## Dealer S, NS Non Vul, EW Vul

Q Q98653 Q95 A92

107542 J9863 J A74 KJ7 10642 8754 10

> AK K102 A83 KQJ63

## **BIDDING**

NS bid to 6C, without any interference, with South as Declarer

## THE PLAY

West led HJ and Declarer smelt a singleton lead (in fact, it reeked to high heaven). The end was nigh. East would take HA, and return a Heart to be ruffed by West. 1 down (and 6H would have made!)

Declarer hoped - maybe West has HA, and underled it....?

He played HQ from Dummy, East played HA (there went the hope of the underlead)

Then a Eureka moment – throw the HK from Hand! [The Con Job foments....]

He tossed it nonchalantly onto the table, under HA. [The Con Job is laid....]

Poor East. He thought - South's HK is obviously a singleton - no-one in their right mind would drop it under HA. West must have H2 more Hearts, so playing another Heart is pointless, maybe even damaging as it would allow South to discard a loser from Hand as HQ wins the trick

East agonised for a bit, then led what he thought was the Defence's best hope - D2, hoping Declarer would finesse DK if he did not have it. [The Con Job succeeds.....]

Declarer played DA, drew Trumps in 4 rounds ending in Hand, played H10 (East giving a befuddled look as West showed out). Then to rub it in, H2 over to Dummy to run 2 more Hearts to take care of the losing Diamonds in South's Hand. 6C made

South remained tight lipped, as any good Con Man does. West had smoke coming out his ears

'My lead was obviously a \*%!\$#^ singleton Heart', West exhorted. Poor East

A Con Job immaculate by Declarer!
