You hold this Hand as North:

Dealer South, NS Vul

NORTH A874 -AKQ62 K642

You have a strong Hand – 16 Points and a Void, or put another way, a 4-loser Hand (KQ of Spades and AQ of Clubs)

The bidding goes as follows:

What should North bid?

- North must massively re-evaluate his Hand. Partner promises 12 + Points and 5+ Spades (so NS have at least 28 Points between them). West has overcalled, so should have at least 10 Points.
 So, East will probably have next to none.
- If South does not hold CA, then West will surely hold it, thus making CK safe
- The void in Hearts helps, as South can ruff Heart losers in Dummy
- The Diamond suit is a very good second suit

Thus, North knows a Game is on, and should explore Slam

It is possible that 7S is on, so I would bid 3D (forcing) to hear South's response

The Bidding then proceeds as follows:

THE PLAY

There is nothing to the play. West started with HA, South ruffed in Dummy, drew Trumps, and it was all over – 13 Tricks

COMMENT

North sees his Hand grow stronger with each bid by South and 6S must be bid

[It is hard for North to bid 7S, as South could have HA instead of CA]

MORAL OF THE STORY

You must re-evaluate your Hand as you hear the other players bidding
